

UCLA Volunteer Center Impact Report 2014-2015





About the Center

In 2009, the UCLA Volunteer Center was launched by its first project: UCLA Volunteer Day on September 22. Since that year, Volunteer Day has become the nation's largest service project for new university students. A project that began with 4,000 participants with eight service projects has grown to involve more than 8,000 UCLA community members at sites that reach every major community in the city.

The Volunteer Center has expanded to organize many other unique annual programs and events that involve the greater Bruin community in civic engagement. Through its website and use of social media, the Center also serves as a hub for information about community involvement, featuring how-to guides, the recognition of campus and community leaders, and an interactive database of volunteer opportunities in Los Angeles.

The Volunteer Center also serves as a model for the planning, design, implementation, and management of large-scale community projects that can be replicated by other universities, companies, and organizations.

Mission

The mission of the UCLA Volunteer Center is to inspire the more than 400,000 members of the extended UCLA family, as well as the community at large, to create social change through lifelong participation in volunteer programs and civic engagement.



Current Priorities

During the 2014-2015 academic year, the Volunteer Center built upon existing programs to expand opportunities for UCLA community members to become involved in civic engagement and volunteerism. The following were the principles and priorities guiding the Center's work.

- ENGAGEMENT: Connecting members of the UCLA community to UCLA Volunteer Day, One Bus, One Cause, Non-profit Networking Night, and other service opportunities in various districts throughout Greater Los Angeles, working closely with community partners and elected officials to identify areas of greatest need
- LEADERSHIP: Cultivating students to become lifelong advocates for social change through leadership programs such as the Volunteer Center Fellows, Social Media and Marketing Internship Program, Project SPELL, and the Volunteer Leadership Program
- COLLABORATION: Fostering relationships with campus and external partners which result in holistic, productive, and meaningful experiences for volunteers and those being served
- JUSTICE: Engaging volunteers in purposeful interactions with disadvantaged youth and adults in order to promote educational equality and social justice
- TECHNOLOGY: Creating digital marketing campaigns and utilizing the power of social networks in order to inspire individuals to participate in local, regional, and international service-related activities
- SUSTAINABILITY: Contributing to a sustainable future through the planning of environmentally-themed service projects and the implementation of office procedures that comply with University-wide sustainability protocols
- INNOVATION: Serving as a model for the planning, design, and implementation of large-scale community projects that can be replicated by other universities, companies, and organizations

In addition to the above highlighted programs, the Center spent months preparing for the 2015 Special Olympics World Games, which took place in July and August. The Games required a large scale recruitment effort resulting in over 900 UCLA volunteers, mostly UCLA employees, giving Olympians and guests a grand welcome during the events taking place on campus.



Events and Programs

UCLA Volunteer Day is a cornerstone of the UCLA experience. It is the nation's largest community participation event for new students, occurring during True Bruin Welcome. In September 2014, first year freshmen and transfer students joined together with continuing undergraduates, graduate students, faculty, staff, alumni, parents, and community members to visit 48 sites across greater Los Angeles. Participants learned important skills including leadership, task coordination, volunteer recruitment and retention, and event planning. Over 6,200 Bruins participated, creating an immediate impact on both the participant and site.

Using the momentum and enthusiasm for civic engagement that arises from Volunteer Day, One Bus, One Cause sends a bus filled with around 50 volunteers into the community in order to address specific needs in that area. Through partnerships with other non-profits, this program addresses a different cause and organization with each visit, exposing Bruins to a variety of volunteer opportunities and piquing volunteers' interest in programs they could work with on an ongoing basis. One Bus, One Cause projects during 2014-2015 included elementary schools, AIDS Walk LA, the LA Regional Food Bank, veterans organizations, and community gardens

Project SPELL

Project SPELL, Students for Progress in Employee Language Learning, is a support service for UCLA employees who are non-native English speakers. This program matches UCLA employee learners with student volunteer tutors to accomplish the learners' language learning goals. Volunteer tutors deliver personalized lessons to a UCLA employee twice a week throughout the academic quarter, and they also receive training sessions, ample teaching resources, and a flourishing peer network. For 96% of learners in the program, Project SPELL is their only method of learning English; they are taking no other classes. This year, Project SPELL introduced a technology curriculum to supplement language learning and help learners feel confident using email and the internet. In addition, the Volunteer Center is partnering with the UC Education Evaluation Center to develop a comprehensive logic model outlining the major components of Project SPELL and their short term, intermediate, and long term outcomes. These outcomes will be used to refine existing instruments and formulate a program evaluation to better assess the successes and areas of need throughout the program.





Operation Gratitude

United States military service members in hostile regions around the world receive approximately 6,000 hand-written letters and care packages from UCLA each year in partnership with Operation Gratitude, a volunteer-run non-profit group based in Van Nuys. The partnership strives to demonstrate recognition of, and appreciation for, military members' service and sacrifice. The Center works year-round with campus departments and organizations to introduce students to the program. UCLA is the first large-scale university the organization has paired with to increase these efforts.






Volunteer Center Fellows

Each spring, a new group of students are chosen to serve for thirteen months as UCLA Volunteer Center Fellows. The Fellows serve as an advisory board that works with the Center to increase the accessibility of community service and civic engagement opportunities by creating and promoting resources, programs, and projects for both campus service organizations and students. Fellows come from a variety of community and leadership perspectives at UCLA and in the Los Angeles community, but all share a commitment to service. The Community Service Commission, Community Programs Office, and Office of Residential Life all select one representative to serve as a Fellow, while the rest of the board consists of at-large members. In 2014-2015, for the first time, the Center offered a \$1,000 scholarship to each student participating as a Fellow.

In 2012, to expose students with special needs to cutting edge research, the Volunteer Center Fellows created a quarterly event called Three Pillars, One University. Three Pillars provides students with special needs from the Pathway at UCLA Extension program the chance to attend a professor research symposium, allowing them to learn about some of the most acclaimed research taking place at UCLA. In 2015, Special Olympics at UCLA became a program partner, and athletes from Special Olympics Southern California were invited to join Pathway students and other community members in the interactive workshops. Operation Gratitude has sent over one million care packages since 2003, and UCLA is the first large-scale university that the organization has paired with to increase these efforts.

On Friday, April 17, the Center recognized its student leaders, the Volunteer Center Fellows, Student Committee for Project SPELL, Project SPELL tutors, and those students who have served on program committees throughout the year with the Center with a formal reception in the courtyard of the Fowler Museum.
